Biography

16.8.1907	Born in Kolozsvár, (Hungary) capital of Transylvania now Cluj (Romania), to his parents David and Sarah Boskovich.
1915	Begins to learn the violin at the age of 8 at the Gheorghe Dima Conservatory and Academy of Music (Cluj); later changes to piano. Accepted by Hevesi Piroska, a well-known pianist and pedagogue for gifted children at the Institute de Pregatire de Artisti.
1924	Goes to Vienna. Studies composition with Richard Stöhr and piano with Viktor Ebenstein at the Academy of Music .
1925/6	Returns home. Leaves for Paris, where he studies piano with Lazar Levy at the Conservatoire National Supérieur. Continues piano studies with Alfred Cortot and composition with Paul Dukas and Nadia Boulanger at the Ecôle Normale de Musique . Specializes in vocal and choral music at the Schola Cantorum.
1929	Returns to Cluj. Manifold activities as composer, concert pianist and conductor at the National Opera.
1934	Founder and conductor of the Karl Goldmark Symphony Orchestra, comprised entirely of Jewish musicians. Among highlights: program with violinist Bronislaw Hubermann.
	Member of Jewish student organization "Bnei Brit". Embarks on a research tour through Carpathian villages to study the musical folklore and collect the beautiful melodies of local Jewish communities.
1938	Invited by the Palestine Symphony Orchestra (now the Israel Philharmonic Orchestra) to attend the premiere of his orchestral suite

1939	Co-founder of an opera company in Tel Aviv. Produces and conducts Offenbach's <i>Les Contes d'Hoffmann</i> .
1942/3	Becomes acquainted with the Yemenite singer Bracha Zephira.
1944	Works with the dancer Yardena Cohen, preparing piano transcripts of Iraqi-Jewish ensemble music for her dance works based on Biblical themes.
1945	Co-founder with five of his Hungarian collegues of the Israeli Conservatory and Academy of Music in Tel Aviv. Head of the Department of Composition and Theoretical Subjects. Teaches composition, harmony and counterpoint.
1946	Receives the tragic news that his parents perished in Auschwitz.
1950	Married to Miriam Israelit
1950	Scholarship from the Ministry of Education and Culture for a three-months study tour to Europe. Meets, among others, Honneger, Messiaen , Milhaud and Hindemith. Writes travel reviews for <i>Al Hamishmar</i> . Lectures on the BBC and at Hilversum, the Netherlands, on Israeli music.
